

Foundation - Partner Feature: The Seltzer-Chan Pond Inlet Foundation

The Seltzer-Chan Pond Inlet Foundation is a registered Canadian charity that supports Inuit culture and youth in Pond Inlet, Nunavut. The foundation was established to honour the memory of Mark Seltzer and Marilyn Chan who lost their lives while kayaking near Pond Inlet on July 16, 1998. A committee of local volunteers reviews applications and recommends which projects the Toronto-based Board of Directors should fund based on

the foundation's goals of preserving Inuit traditions, culture and language, assisting students with education or training programs and relieving poverty.

Since its inception, the foundation has supported community cultural projects such as trips on the land and programs where elders teach youth traditional methods of sewing or preparing country food, local daycares, Mittima

Food Bank, high school student awards, sports teams and tournaments, assistance for students attending postsecondary programs, and of course, Tusarnaarniq Sivumut Association - Music for the Future.

Since 2009, the Seltzer-Chan Pond Inlet Foundation has given more than \$70,000 to

TSA to support opportunities for youth at Nasivvik High School in Pond Inlet to learn music through our in-person fiddle workshops and more recently, virtual music lessons. It was through our connection with SCPIF that two videographers from RYOT Films travelled to Pond Inlet in April 2014, which resulted in the beautiful video we share on our website. Qarasaujakkut Nijjausijarriursaniq Update

Given the ongoing travel limitations imposed by the pandemic, our main focus this year was on Qarasaujakkut Nijjausijarriursaniq, our virtual lessons for both fiddle and guitar. Fiddle instructor, Stacey Read, was teaching students at Iglulik High School in Igloolik since September and began a second group at Nasivvik High School in Pond Inlet in April, a delayed start from our November plan - due to gathering restrictions. We also added guitar lessons for students in Pond Inlet too, with instructor Cam Neufeld who hails from Edmonton. Both led fantastic virtual lessons for many students that were incredibly well-received.

A big thank you to Mali Bickley at Taking It Global and Connected North for the partnership and support of our online lessons. TSA is pleased to be a Provider through Connected North and looks forward to offering even more in 2022-2023.

Our goal is to continue to offer online lessons to schools and communities, with an opportunity to expand to new communities, especially those that are more remote as a means to provide an opportunity we may not have otherwise had.

In March, TSA connected with Umimmak School in Grise Fiord and as a result, we're happy to announce that virtual guitar lessons will begin this September. As of May 2022, four guitars in hardshell travel cases along with a host of

accessories including strings and music books were shipped to Montreal where they will be crated and put on the sealift slated to arrive in Grise Fiord this summer. Want to learn more about the sealift? Stay tuned for our next newsletter.
